Dennis and Dan Shiels, two cousins who grew up in Cincinnati and attended the same grade school and high school, are valued members of the Beechwood community. Both have served on the Board, Dan – twice. Dennis was introduced to Beechwood through his good friend, Tim Zimmerman and Susan Hochbein offered the opportunity to Dan.

Growing up in large families and attending religious schools shaped their values, teaching them to be "men for others," as the motto of St. Xavier High School, their alma mater, challenges. For both, it is a part of who they are.

At a young age, Dennis was hit by a car and spent months in rehabilitation, dependent on others. He was lucky, though. He fully recovered and became an excellent swimmer in high school and college and then set up his own business. However, the disability he experienced after the accident had a profound effect on him; he recognized how difficult life can be when you are physically challenged and dependent. Today he helps Beechwood as much as he can. Few places have touched his heart as much as Beechwood. "It makes sense to be a regular contributor."

Dan has many reasons for caring about Beechwood. He gives many hours to Beechwood. Five years ago he began the Clay Shoot, a signature event for the home, one that is growing every year. His leadership has helped to raise money for the Friends of Beechwood, a fund that helps with operating and programming costs for the Beechwood residents. His board involvement required many hours and utilized his knowledge of business.

Fifteen years ago, suffering from the effects of chemotherapy, he would come to Beechwood for a reality check. He came in the back door and walked the halls and talked with the residents, whom he has come to love and admire.

Both Dennis and Dan understand the financial challenges the home faces. Because 88% of the residents are on Medicaid, a gap of over \$120 a day per resident – over a million dollars per year - has to be filled. The support they and their recruits give helps to lighten the financial pressure on the home.



Julia Smith started working at Beechwood just before Jimmy Carter became president in 1976. Julia, who has been working since she was fifteen-years-old, received her associate degree and was determined to work at Beechwood. Her brother had worked at Beechwood for 15 years as an orderly, so she knew the story of Beechwood. She said she knew it was a family place. Many of the staff had family members working there. After applying three times, Julia was hired in the dietary department, where she has worked since she

was hired as cook, assistant cook, and lead person on weekends.

"I never meant to stay this long," Julia said. After she would complete her dietary planning and nutrition classes, she thought she might continue her profession at some other place. So what kept her at Beechwood? "The atmosphere of family, the closeness I felt and the dedication of the staff and volunteers," she responded.

"I am just glad I've been able to work here the time I have. It has been a learning experience, "Julia said. She likes doing what she can to make things better for everyone at Beechwood. And she surely has!

The kind of person who easily makes friends, Vergie has many people who are special to her. Debbie and Mike have made her a part of their family; she spends holidays with them at their home.


Her eyes light up when she talks about their many kindnesses over the years.
